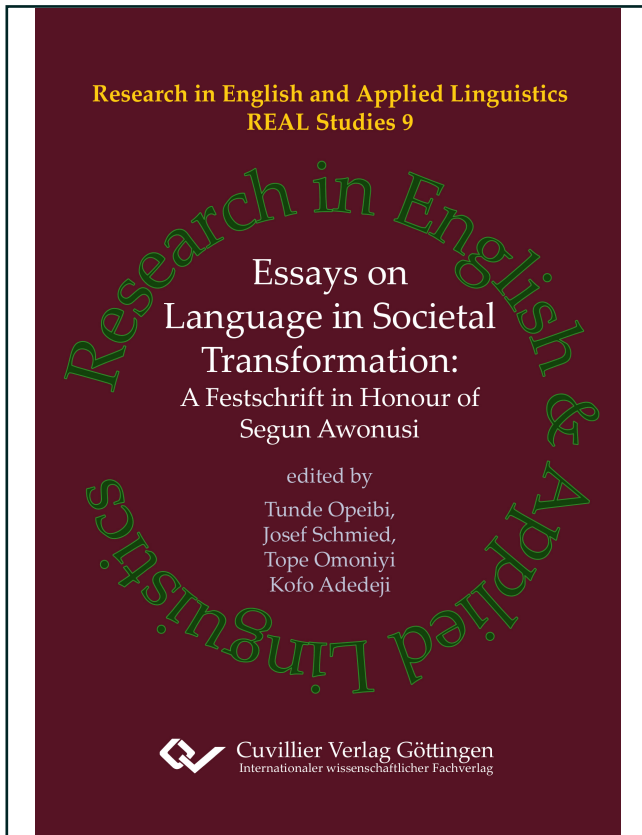




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Essays on Language in Societal Transformation

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Foreword

It is a great honour and privilege for me to have the opportunity to write this foreword for a Festschrift in honour of a colleague and friend whom I hold in very high esteem, Professor Segun Awonusi.

The collection of papers in this volume is a fitting tribute to Professor Awonusi's lifetime of academic labour and contribution to knowledge. Awonusi being one of the pioneer sociolinguists who have explored the sociolinguistics of English as a second language in Nigeria, this volume aptly covers the four major areas of his academic interest and contribution, namely phonology and phonetics, English Language in Nigeria, Sociolinguistics and Social Media, General topics on university administration
